




Resources for Language Arts Lessons Based on Northern Texts











What is it?

These book studies are collections of language arts lessons for Inuktitut and English based on texts with a Northern perspective or focus. The book studies are based on a variety of genres, including novels, graphic novels, and Inuit traditional stories, and some also include links to films. There are book studies available for a wide range of grade levels. The book studies in this collection are for Grades 5 to 12.

Each book study contains the following:

- Lessons. The sequence of lessons in each book study is designed to support students' comprehension of the text and provide learning opportunities based on the unique features of the text. Students work on language arts concepts and skills while exploring the important themes, ideas, and questions woven into each text.
- Extension activities. These activities challenge students to continue developing their skills and take advantage of the unique creative opportunities inspired by each text. They are very useful when students need an extra challenge.
- Handouts. Many of the lessons include handouts that reinforce lesson objectives. The handouts often feature supportive visuals, including artwork pulled directly from the text.







How can this resource be used in the classroom?

The learning activities contained in each book study connect to the language arts curriculum for the targeted grade level. They are designed to strengthen students' listening, speaking, reading, writing, viewing, and visual representation skills. Each book study can be used by language arts teachers in the following ways:

- Teachers can complete the book study with the whole class as a unit of study.
- Teachers can complete the book study with a small group of students.
- Teachers can assign the whole book study or selected activities from the book study to individual students as an independent study unit.



The book studies contain several features to ensure that teachers have success while using the resource.


• **Lessons.** The lessons in the text are broken down into detailed, step-by-step instructions and contain teaching tips for best practices.





- **General accommodations and modifications.** Some students may require additional support in order to be successful with the learning activities in the book study. This section suggests different accommodations and modifications that can be used with the activities.
- Information about the book study. This section provides teachers with important background information about using the book study, including an overview of learning activities, learning objectives, and themes. This section also contains important notes to educators on how to use the book study successfully.

Why use this resource?

The book studies were developed to facilitate the use of Northern texts in Nunavut classrooms, including books written by Nunavut authors. The texts chosen for the book studies allow Nunavut students to read, write, and speak about what matters most to them. Students learn in depth about significant and relevant Northern topics, such as the land, aspects of Inuit cultural heritage, and stories from the Inuit oral tradition. In novels written by Nunavut authors, students read about and discuss issues that face Northern youth. The book studies contain rich and varied learning activities that give all students the opportunity to become engaged in meaningful language arts learning.
