- Topic:Mother tongue and Language spoken most often at home<br/>2006 Census of Population<br/>Released by Statistics Canada, December 4, 2007
- **Background:** In 2006, Inuktitut was the most predominant mother tongue in Nunavut, with **20,185** persons declaring it as their only mother tongue, followed by English, with **7,770** persons. About **295** people had Inuinnaqtun as their only mother tongue.

The proportion of persons in Nunavut whose only mother tongue was Inuktitut or Inuinnaqtun was **70%** in 2006, the same percentage observed in 2001. However, the proportion of Nunavummiut speaking Inuktitut or Inuinnaqtun the most often at home declined slightly during that five year period, from **57%** in 2001 to **54%** in 2006.

Although English was the only mother tongue of about **26%** of Nunavut residents in 2006, it was the language spoken most often at home for **44%** of the population.

**Mother tongue** refers to the first language learned at home in childhood and still understood by the individual at the time of the census.

Language spoken most often at home refers to the language spoken most often at home by the individual at the time of the census.

**Background:** In 2006, Inuktitut was the mother tongue of almost 7 people out of 10 in Nunavut. This proportion was the highest amongst Nunavummiut aged 65 years and over. About **86%** of persons in this age group declared having Inuktitut as their only mother tongue. Youths aged 15 to 24 years had the second highest proportion of Inuktitut as mother tongue at **73%**. On the other hand, the adults aged 40 to 54 years had the lowest proportion (**63%**) of all age groups to have Inuktitut as their only mother tongue.
