PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, S. Nu. 2016, c. 13

TRAVEL RESTRICTION ORDER (#14)

WHEREAS:

- A. The Minister of Health has declared a Public Health Emergency in Nunavut effective March 20, 2020 to address the novel coronavirus COVID-19 pandemic, and may renew this declaration every fourteen (14) days for the duration of the public health emergency;
- B. Pursuant to section 41(1) of the *Public Health Act*, the Chief Public Health Officer may take certain actions, including issuing directions or orders for the purposes of protecting the public health and preventing, remedying or mitigating the effects of the public health emergency;
- C. The Government of the Northwest Territories has imposed restrictions on entry into the Northwest Territories pursuant to section 33 of the Northwest Territories *Public Health Act*, S.N.W.T. 2007, c. 17; and
- D. The Government of Canada has imposed restrictions on entry into Canada pursuant to section 58 of the *Quarantine Act*;

THEREFORE, the Chief Public Health Officer hereby orders the following:

- 1. The Travel Restriction Order (#13) effective July 7, 2021 is rescinded and replaced with this Order.
- 2. In this Order,
 - a. “community transmission” means individuals contracting COVID-19 where public health officials are unable to determine the time, source, and location of the transmission.
 - b. “contact tracing information” means
 - i. The names of all persons departing a mine site or a wilderness tourism accommodation to a community in Nunavut;
 - ii. For each person, the dates they were present at the mine site or wilderness tourism accommodation; and
 - iii. For each person, the community to which they are departing.

- c. “Fully Vaccinated” means, in relation to an individual:
 - i. the individual has received the recommended number of doses of a COVID-19 vaccine authorized for use by Health Canada; and
 - ii. more than fourteen (14) days have elapsed since the individual received the last of the recommended number of doses.
- d. “outbreak” means evidence of transmission of COVID-19 in a location that has been confirmed by the Chief Public Health Officer.

Part 1: Nunavut and Northwest Territories Common Travel Area

- 3. Pursuant to subsection 41 (1) (e) of the Act, the Nunavut and Northwest Territories Common Travel Area is established, consisting of all parts of Canada within the territorial boundaries of Nunavut as set out in the *Nunavut Act* and the Northwest Territories as set out in the *Northwest Territories Act*.
- 4. All persons may travel throughout the Nunavut and Northwest Territories Common Travel Area, where:
 - a. They have not been physically present outside either the Nunavut and Northwest Territories Common Travel Area or the Nunavut and Churchill, Manitoba Common Travel Area in the fourteen (14) days prior to travel;
 - b. They have completed any mandatory self-isolation protocol required by an order of the Chief Public Health Officer in Nunavut, the Northwest Territories, or Manitoba or are exempt from self-isolation; and
 - c. They stay within the boundaries of the Nunavut and Northwest Territories Common Travel Area for the duration of travel.
- 5. Persons seeking to travel from the Northwest Territories to Nunavut must contact the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer for Nunavut and provide:
 - a. Contact information, such as an address and phone number, at the person’s regular place of residence;
 - b. Contact information, such as an address and phone number where the person can be reached while in Nunavut; and
 - c. A written declaration containing the information set out in Appendix “A” to this Order.

6. Persons must produce proof of authorization to travel from the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer prior to travelling to Nunavut, except where persons are exempt from this requirement pursuant to paragraph 9.
7. All persons seeking to travel to the Northwest Territories from Nunavut must comply with any Orders issued by the Chief Public Health Officer of the Northwest Territories while they are present in the Northwest Territories.
8. All persons who leave the Nunavut and Northwest Territories Common Travel Area are subject to the isolation requirements set out in Part 3 of this Order unless they are Fully Vaccinated and qualify for an exemption in Part 4.
9. Persons travelling on scheduled flights between the Kitikmeot Region and any other part of Nunavut containing a stopover or change of aircraft in Yellowknife, Northwest Territories are exempt from the requirements in paragraphs 5 and 6.

Part 2: Nunavut and Churchill, Manitoba Common Travel Area

10. Pursuant to subsection 41 (1) (e) of the Act, the Nunavut and Churchill, Manitoba Common Travel Area is established, consisting of all parts of Canada within the territorial boundaries of Nunavut as set out in the *Nunavut Act* and the municipal boundaries of the Town of Churchill in the Province of Manitoba as defined in the *Municipal Status and Boundaries Regulation*, Man. Reg. 567/88 R, and includes overland travel in unpopulated areas between the boundary between Nunavut and Manitoba and the Town of Churchill.
11. All persons may travel throughout the Nunavut and Churchill, Manitoba Common Travel Area, where:
 - a. They have not been physically present outside either the Nunavut and Northwest Territories Common Travel Area or the Nunavut and Churchill, Manitoba Common Travel Area in the fourteen (14) days prior to travel;
 - b. They have completed any mandatory self-isolation protocol required by an order of the Chief Public Health Officer in Nunavut, the Northwest Territories, or Manitoba or are exempt from self-isolation;
 - c. They stay within the boundaries of the Nunavut and Churchill, Manitoba Common Travel Area for the duration of travel.

12. All persons seeking to travel from Nunavut to Churchill, Manitoba must contact the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer for Nunavut and provide:
 - a. Contact information, such as an address and phone number, at the person's regular place of residence;
 - b. Contact information, such as an address and phone number where the person can be reached while in Nunavut; and
 - c. A written declaration containing the information set out in Appendix "A" to this Order.
13. All persons must produce proof of authorization to travel from the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer prior to travelling to Nunavut.
14. All persons seeking to travel to Churchill, Manitoba from Nunavut must comply with any Orders issued by the Chief Public Health Officer of Manitoba while they are present in Manitoba.
15. All persons who leave the Nunavut and Churchill, Manitoba Common Travel Area are subject to the isolation requirements set out in Part 3 of this Order unless they are Fully Vaccinated and qualify for an exemption in Part 4.

Part 3: All Other Travel to Nunavut

16. Pursuant to subsection 41(1)(e) of the Act, all travel to Nunavut originating from across any inter-jurisdictional border, including the boundary between Nunavut and the Northwest Territories, but excluding the boundary between Nunavut and the municipal boundaries of the Town of Churchill, Manitoba is hereby restricted to:
 - a. Nunavut residents returning to Nunavut bearing a letter of authorization from the Chief Public Health Officer in accordance with paragraph 17;
 - b. Nunavut residents returning to Nunavut from medical travel and any Nunavut residents serving as medical travel escorts, subject to specific exemptions and the direction and authorization of the Chief Public Health Officer in accordance with paragraph 17;
 - c. Non-residents entering Nunavut for the purposes of commencing a contract of employment bearing a letter of authorization from the Chief Public Health Officer in accordance with paragraph 17;

- d. Non-residents entering Nunavut for the purposes of family reunification bearing a letter of authorization from the Chief Public Health Officer in accordance with paragraph 17;
- e. Persons providing services in the course of importation/exportation of goods and other supply chain workers, including those persons who are necessary to maintain supply chain transportation services;
- f. Flight crews working on any flights arriving in Nunavut, including medical evacuation flights;
- g. Marine vessel crews working on vessels engaged in the annual marine resupply (sealift), subject to any specific directions and orders of the Chief Public Health Officer;
- h. Persons engaged in providing critical services bearing a letter from their employer stating the urgent need for the persons to travel to Nunavut;
- i. Persons engaged in providing support services to critical services workers bearing a letter from their employer stating an urgent need for the persons to travel to Nunavut;
- j. Nunavut Inuit exercising their rights as set out in Article 5 of the *Nunavut Agreement* and who exercise the right to harvest outside of Nunavut may travel back to their place of residence in Nunavut if they have not travelled to a community or populated area outside a Common Travel Area as defined in Part 2 of this order. If the person has traveled to a community or populated area outside of the Common Travel Area, they shall not travel within Nunavut unless they do so in accordance with paragraph 17 (a) of this order;
- k. A person from the Northwest Territories, who has an Aboriginal or treaty right in an area of Nunavut while exercising that right within Nunavut may travel back to their place of residence in the Northwest Territories if they have not travelled to a community or populated area in Nunavut.
- l. A person from outside of Nunavut or the Northwest Territories, who has an Aboriginal or treaty right to harvest in an area of Nunavut while exercising that right within Nunavut. Those persons may continue to

exercise those rights but shall not travel to a community or populated area of Nunavut;

- m. Transient workers in operating mines who enter Nunavut on private flights operating directly to and from the mine site;
- n. Persons engaged in the construction of critical infrastructure projects, subject to specific directions and orders of the Chief Public Health Officer;
- o. Persons being transported to a correctional facility in Nunavut, along with those persons engaged in the transportation or escort to a correctional facility in Nunavut;
- p. Persons being transported to or from a hospital or health facility outside Nunavut pursuant to an order under the *Mental Health Act* or the *Public Health Act*, including patients and those persons who are required to travel with those patients;
- q. Members of the Canadian Armed Forces and civilian employees posted to the Canadian Forces Stations in Alert and Eureka who enter Nunavut on military flights operating directly to and from the stations; these individuals must remain at their assigned station and shall not enter any community or populated area of Nunavut;
- r. Any foreign national, including a Temporary Foreign Worker entitled to enter Canada pursuant to the Federal Orders-in-Council 2021-0613 or 2021-0614 or any subsequent Federal Order-in-Council respecting entry to Canada, with an urgent and substantial need to enter Nunavut bearing a letter of authorization from the Chief Public Health Officer;
- s. Any Person, including flight and vessel crewmembers who enter Canada at a fixed or temporary Port of Entry in Nunavut who is permitted to enter Canada pursuant to Federal Orders-in-Council 2021-0613 or 2020-0614 or any subsequent Federal Order-in-Council respecting entry to Canada;
- t. Any other Person with an urgent and substantial need to enter Nunavut bearing a letter of authorization from the Chief Public Health Officer;

- u. Members of the Canadian Armed Forces, Canadian Coast Guard and Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary on active service in Nunavut; and
- v. Persons entering Nunavut for the purposes of engaging in wilderness tourism in accordance with Part 6 of this Order.

17. Pursuant to subsection 41(1)(g) of the Act and in order to decrease or eliminate the risk to the public health in relation to novel coronavirus COVID-19, persons within Nunavut are subject to the following restrictions, as specifically set out below:

- a. Prior to returning to Nunavut, all persons listed in paragraphs 16 (a), (c), (d), (n), (r), (s), and (t) who are not Fully Vaccinated must complete a minimum fourteen-day isolation period, either voluntarily or subject to an order by an official having jurisdiction, at a place designated by the Chief Public Health Officer in Ottawa Ontario, Winnipeg Manitoba, or Edmonton Alberta. Upon completion of the isolation period, the Chief Public Health Officer will issue these persons with a clearance letter authorizing them to return to Nunavut.
- b. Prior to returning to Nunavut, all persons listed in paragraph 16 (b) who are not Fully Vaccinated must complete a minimum fourteen-day isolation period at a place designated by the Chief Public Health Officer, either prior to returning to Nunavut or immediately upon their return, subject to the direction of the Chief Public Health Officer.
- c. All persons listed in paragraphs 16 (e), (f), (g), (h), (i), (j), (k), (l), (m), (o), (p), (q), and (u) are exempt from the fourteen-day isolation period.
- d. Persons who are Fully Vaccinated shall comply with the requirements set out in Part 4 of this Order.
- e. The Members of Parliament and Senators representing Nunavut and the Northwest Territories, and Members of the Nunavut Legislative Assembly are entitled to an exemption from the fourteen-day isolation period upon written request to the Chief Public Health Officer when travelling for official Parliamentary or Legislative Assembly business. For greater certainty, these individuals may choose to complete the

fourteen-day isolation period set out in paragraph 17 (a) when travelling for official Parliamentary or Legislative Assembly business and must complete the isolation period when travelling for personal business unless they are Fully Vaccinated.

- f. All persons seeking to travel to Nunavut, including Nunavut residents, must advise the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer if they have been outside of Canada at any time during the fourteen (14) days prior to their anticipated return to Nunavut, and demonstrate proof of compliance with any applicable quarantine and isolation orders issued under the *Quarantine Act*.
- g. The Chief Public Health Officer may issue certificates of authorization to individuals who can demonstrate that they have completed a fourteen-day isolation period. These residents do not have to complete the isolation period set out in paragraph 17 (a).
- h. The isolation periods in paragraphs 17 (a) and (b) may be extended to accommodate air carrier schedules and flight cancellations. This extension period shall not exceed six (6) days.
- i. Persons listed in paragraphs 16 (o) and (p) must return to Nunavut on charter flights arranged by the Government of Nunavut or the Government of Canada. These persons may be subject to isolation in a secure location upon their return to Nunavut.
- j. All persons who are not Fully Vaccinated and are exempt from the isolation period set out in paragraph 17 (a) shall self-isolate in accordance with *Mandatory Self-Isolation Order (#3)* or any subsequent order respecting self-isolation.
- k. All persons who are exempt from the isolation period set out in paragraph 17 (a) must self-monitor and contact a Medical Health Officer immediately to undergo a risk assessment if they develop symptoms of COVID-19.
- l. Prior to entering Nunavut, all persons who travelled outside of Canada at any time in the fourteen days prior to entering Nunavut must produce proof of compliance with federal Order-in-Council P.C. 2021-615 or any

subsequent applicable quarantine and isolation orders issued under the *Quarantine Act*.

- m. Upon entering Nunavut, persons listed in paragraph 16 (s) must report to the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer within one (1) hour of arrival and shall not leave the airport or Port of Entry until directed by the Chief Public Health Officer.
 - n. Persons entering Nunavut from outside Canada must enter at the Iqaluit International Airport or to fixed or designated Ports of Entry.
 - o. Persons travelling on flights to Nunavut which must land at an airport outside Nunavut for a station stop, technical stop, or a diversion due to weather or an emergency may continue travelling to Nunavut provided that the station stop, technical stop, or diversion lasts no longer than ninety (90) minutes and the persons remain within the airport premises at the diversion airport. If the station stop, technical stop, or diversion exceeds ninety (90) minutes, the flight must return to its departure point or to another destination outside Nunavut if it is safe to do so unless authorized by the Chief Public Health Officer. For greater certainty, the flight must report to the Chief Public Health Officer for instructions if its time at the airport, including planned and unplanned stops, exceeds three (3) hours .
18. Persons exempted in paragraphs 17 (c) and (d) shall comply with all recommendations and directions provided by Medical Health Officers.

Part 4: Fully Vaccinated Travellers

19. Persons who are Fully Vaccinated may apply to the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer for an exemption from the fourteen (14) day isolation period set out in paragraphs 17 (a) and (b). The exemption application must include a written declaration including the information set out in Appendix “B” to this Order.
20. The Chief Public Health Officer shall issue certificates of authorization exempting Fully Vaccinated persons from the isolation requirements set out in paragraphs 17 (a) and (b) for all persons who comply with the requirements in paragraph 19.

21. The Chief Public Health Officer shall revoke an individual's certificate of authorization where:

- a. A designated person within the Department of Health advises the individual, either orally or in writing, that the Department of Health is unable to verify that the individual is Fully Vaccinated;
- b. The individual revokes their consent set out in the declaration in Appendix "B"; or
- c. The individual does not provide an official record of each of their COVID-19 vaccinations or a suitable alternative such as a statutory declaration or certified extract from the individual's medical records.

22. If the Chief Public Health Officer revokes an individual's certificate of authorization, the individual shall immediately self-isolate in accordance with *Mandatory Self-Isolation Order (#3)* or any subsequent order respecting self-isolation.

Part 5: Travel to and from Mine Sites

23. In this part, "mine site" means any operating mine where the owners or operators have implemented a return to work protocol approved by the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer; and

24. Travel from any community in Nunavut to mine sites is restricted to:

- a. Mine employees and contractors;
- b. Inspectors and officials appointed pursuant to the laws of Nunavut or Canada;
- c. Representatives or agents of institutions of public government established pursuant to the *Nunavut Agreement*, including but not limited to the Nunavut Impact Review Board;
- d. Law enforcement officers operating in the course of their duties;
- e. Health care service providers; and
- f. Air and marine carriers delivering passengers or goods to the mine.

25. Persons listed in paragraph 24 may travel from a mine site to any community in Nunavut if there is no community transmission at the mine site.
26. If the Chief Public Health Officer confirms that there is community transmission at the mine site, Nunavut residents must:
- a. obtain a certificate of authorization from the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer before leaving the mine site; and
 - b. self-isolate in accordance with *Mandatory Self-Isolation Order (#3)* or any subsequent order respecting self-isolation upon their arrival in their destination community.
27. Non-residents must travel directly to and from the mine site in the manner prescribed in paragraph 16 (m).
28. Mine operators shall submit contact tracing information to the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer within twenty-four (24) hours of the end of each work rotation.
29. Nothing in this Part restricts Nunavut Inuit from exercising their rights set out in the *Nunavut Agreement*, including but not limited to the right to harvest set out in Article 5 of that Agreement.

Part 6: Wilderness Tourism

30. In this Part, “Operator”, “Wilderness Tourism”, and “Wilderness Tourism Accommodation” have the same meanings as set out in the *Tourism Act*.
31. Operators with a Wilderness Tourism Operator COVID-19 Operations Plan that has been approved by the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer may open to Nunavut residents and non-residents.
32. Persons listed in paragraph 16 (v) of this Order who are not Fully Vaccinated are exempt from the isolation requirements in paragraph 17 (a) provided:
- a. They travel directly to the Wilderness Tourism Accommodation from a destination outside Nunavut without a station stop, technical stop, or diversion in any community other than Iqaluit, Rankin Inlet, or Cambridge Bay while in transit.

- b. They comply with any applicable obligations in the Operator's Wilderness Tourism Operator COVID-19 Operations Plan.
 - c. Upon arrival at the Wilderness Tourism Accommodation, not entering any community or other populated area of Nunavut for fourteen (14) days after their entry into Nunavut, except:
 - i. Residents and non-residents may leave Nunavut at the end of their stay if earlier than fourteen (14) days from their entry to Nunavut provided they leave Nunavut without a station stop, technical stop, or diversion in any community other than Iqaluit, Rankin Inlet, or Cambridge Bay; and
 - ii. Nunavut residents may enter Iqaluit, Rankin Inlet, or Cambridge Bay, or any other community as directed by a Medical Health Officer, to self-isolate in accordance with *Mandatory Self-Isolation Order (#3)* or any subsequent Order respecting self-isolation.
 - d. They self-monitor and immediately self-isolate away from other persons and contact the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer if they exhibit any symptoms of COVID-19.
33. Persons listed in paragraph 16 (v) of this Order who are Fully Vaccinated may apply for an exemption in accordance with Part 4 of this Order prior to travelling to Nunavut. Exempted travellers may travel to any community in Nunavut at the conclusion of their wilderness tourism activity, except where the Chief Public Health Officer has confirmed community transmission.
34. If the Chief Public Health Officer confirms that there is community transmission at the wilderness tourism accommodation, Nunavut residents intending to travel to a community in Nunavut must:
- a. obtain a certificate of authorization from the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer before leaving the wilderness tourism accommodation; and
 - b. self-isolate in accordance with *Mandatory Self-Isolation Order (#3)* or any subsequent order respecting self-isolation upon their arrival in their destination community.

35. Non-residents must leave Nunavut without a station stop, technical stop, or diversion in any community other than Iqaluit, Rankin Inlet, or Cambridge Bay, except as diverted due to weather or mechanical issues.
36. Operators shall submit contact tracing information to the Office of the Chief Public Health Officer within twenty-four (24) hours of the departure of each group.
37. Failure to comply with an approved Operator's Wilderness Tourism Operator COVID-19 Operations Plan constitutes a breach of this Order.

Part 7: Enforcement

38. Nothing in this Order shall affect parents from exercising their parental responsibilities with their children, including any custody, access or parenting time rights or responsibilities, except:
 - a. As ordered by a court of competent jurisdiction; or
 - b. Where parent or the child is subject to a mandatory isolation order.
39. Pursuant to subsection 41(1)(f) of the *Public Health Act*, members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, municipal by-law enforcement officers, sheriffs appointed pursuant to the *Judicature Act*, the Chief Environmental Protection Officer and Inspectors appointed pursuant to the *Environmental Protection Act*, and Conservation Officers appointed pursuant to the *Wildlife Act* are authorized to implement this order, including entering any premises other than a dwelling without a warrant.
40. Pursuant to subsection 41 (1) (f) of the *Public Health Act*, the Chief Tourism Officer and Tourism Officers appointed pursuant to the *Tourism Act* are authorized to implement Part 6 of this Order, including entering any wilderness tourism accommodation or premises other than a dwelling without a warrant.
41. Pursuant to subsection 41(4) of the *Public Health Act*, the peace officers listed in paragraph 39 may not enter a dwelling without a warrant unless the occupant or person in charge of the dwelling consents.

42. Failure to comply with this Order may be considered a breach of this Order issued under the *Public Health Act* and may result in penalties under the Act, which may include:

- a. A \$575 fine for individuals; and
- b. A \$2875 fine for corporations.

43. Providing false or misleading statements to the Chief Public Health Officer for the purposes of entering Nunavut or circumventing mandatory isolation constitutes a breach of this Order.

44. The Chief Public Health Officer may contact the office of the Chief Public Health Officer or Chief Medical Officer of Health of any province or territory in Canada to confirm compliance with Part 4 of this Order.

This order is effective at 12:01 am Eastern Daylight Time (UTC-4:00) Monday, July 19, 2021 and remains in effect for the duration of the Public Health Emergency, unless otherwise rescinded.

Appendix “A”

Nunavut and Northwest Territories Common Travel Area Nunavut and Churchill, Manitoba Common Travel Area Traveller’s Declaration

Background

1. The Chief Public Health Officer of Nunavut, in partnership with the Chief Public Health Officers of the Northwest Territories and Manitoba has established two Common Travel Areas:
 - a. The Nunavut and Northwest Territories Common Travel Area; and
 - b. The Nunavut and Churchill, Manitoba Common Travel Area.
2. This allows unrestricted travel between Nunavut and the Northwest Territories or between Nunavut and Churchill, Manitoba for anyone who has not travelled outside Nunavut or the Northwest Territories in the fourteen (14) days prior to travel and who have completed any mandatory self-isolation ordered by the Chief Public Health Officer of Nunavut, the Northwest Territories, or Manitoba.
3. Travellers who do not leave a Common Travel Area do not have to isolate prior to their return home.
4. If you leave a Common Travel Area at any time you will have to isolate at a designated facility prior to returning home.
5. The Nunavut and Churchill, Manitoba Common Travel area includes overland travel through unpopulated areas between the Nunavut-Manitoba boundary and Churchill.
6. All Travellers intending to travel to Nunavut must complete this declaration and submit it to CPHOTravelrequests@gov.nu.ca in order to receive a letter of authorization permitting travel and present it to the air carrier upon check-in for verification.
7. Travellers on flights to or from the Kitikmeot Region to any other part of Nunavut containing a stopover or change of aircraft in Yellowknife do not have to complete this Declaration.
8. A parent or guardian may complete the declaration on behalf of their minor children.
9. Making a false declaration is a breach of the Travel Restriction Order.

2. I have been physically present within the boundaries of Nunavut, the Northwest Territories, or Churchill, Manitoba for the past fourteen (14) days.
3. I will not leave the following Common Travel Area during my trip (check the appropriate box):
 - a. Nunavut and Northwest Territories Common Travel Area

b. Nunavut and Churchill, Manitoba Common Travel Area

4. I acknowledge that if I leave the Common Travel Area at any time during my trip, I will have to isolate at a designated facility for at least fourteen (14) days before I can return to Nunavut or the Northwest Territories, and will be responsible for arranging and paying to travel to a designated facility.
5. I consent to the collection of the Contact Tracing Information set out below.

Contact Tracing Information

The following information is collected pursuant to section 17 (1) of the *Public Health Act* and will be used to contact the Traveller in the event of an outbreak of novel coronavirus COVID-19, or where the Chief Public Health Officer has reasonable grounds to believe that the Traveller may have been exposed to novel coronavirus COVID-19. This information may be shared with the Chief Public Health Officer of the Northwest Territories or the Chief Public Health Officer of Manitoba.

Exemption for Fully Vaccinated Travellers Traveller’s Declaration

If you are fully vaccinated, you may choose to be exempted from the isolation requirement under the current Nunavut Travel Restriction Order. You are considered fully vaccinated two weeks after the final dose of COVID-19 vaccine.

All vaccinated travellers intending to travel to Nunavut must complete this declaration and submit it to vaccineexemptions@gov.nu.ca in order to receive a letter of authorization permitting travel and present it to the air carrier upon check-in for verification.

Travellers must sign a legally-binding declaration of vaccination stating they are fully vaccinated with a Health Canada approved vaccine. Declarations will be audited on a regular basis to verify compliance and false declarations may result in fines.

All travellers entering Canada must follow requirements under the current federal quarantine program before applying to come to Nunavut.

- I consent to verification of my vaccination status by the Department of Health using the information provided above.
- I agree to provide any further information needed to confirm my vaccination status, including my health care insurance plan number to the Government of Nunavut upon request.
- I consent to disclosure of this declaration to compliance and enforcement officials for the purpose of enforcing orders made under the *Public Health Act*. This includes your name, address, phone number and email (if applicable).
- I agree that if I withdraw my consent to verification or if I am informed by the Government of Nunavut that my vaccination status was not confirmed, I will isolate as instructed by an official of the Government of Nunavut.
- I consent to the collection of the Contact Tracing Information set out below.
